

and talented musician and vocalist, Florence has been learning the flute since she was ten and is working towards her grade 7. She also plays the piccolo.

Florence is a key player in the school orchestra and concert band as well as a valued member of the choir, performing with Collabro at The Sage earlier this year.

RICHMOND STUDENTS CELEBRATED WITH BRITISH CITIZEN AWARDS

Three community champions have been recognised at this year's British Citizen Youth Awards (BCyA) for their extraordinary contribution to charity. Fourteen-year old James Lunn, his brother Andrew, age 12, and their friend Marcus Weston, age 14, were honoured for their efforts at a formal presentation held at the Palace of Westminster. Attended by 120 guests, including host, Rt. Hon. Lord Blunkett, patrons Dame Mary Perkins and Nicky Cox MBE, speaker Baroness Estelle Morris and presenter and patron Kimberly Wyatt, the renowned British Citizen Youth Awards, in association with Specsavers, highlights individual acts of bravery, kindness and compassion from young people under the age of 18 across the UK.



Mike Faulkner, Co-Founder of the British Citizen Youth Awards, said: "The achievements of these three boys and their commitment to put something back into society, so impressed the Assessment Panel that they were moved to recognise the first-ever trio for a BCyA. The boys collectively endured for the good of others and they are worthy recipients of their specially minted bespoke medals, which are inscribed with the words 'For the Good of the Country'." The boys are invited to use the BCyA letters after their names, as a post-nominal, in recognition of their positive impact on society.

The boys received their BCyA medal from Kimberly Wyatt, member of The Pussycat Dolls, judge of Got to Dance and Celebrity MasterChef champion, who said: "I am honoured to present the British Citizen Youth Awards. This awards programme shines a light on the efforts of our youth and is something to be revered. The world needs more young people like these leading our communities."

Following the formal medal presentations, all guests were treated to an open-top lap of honour tour of the capital on a BCyA-branded double-decker bus, courtesy of Big Bus London, which has supported the BCyA since its inception. After the Awards, the boys were honoured to spend time with Baronness Harris of Richmond who gave them a behind-the-scenes tour of the House of Lords. They were privileged to meet Lord Fowler, the Lord Speaker in the House of Lords Chamber, and were invited to go into the Chamber while the debates of the day were taking place. Baroness Harris said the boys were "great citizens of the world".

This prestigious accolade marks the third award for the boys in recognition of their 300-mile Richmond to Richmond cycling challenge which raised £4,800 for the Butterwick Hospice. Andrew and James invited Marcus to be part of this exciting project. Marcus has a host of health issues, being one of only 400 people worldwide living with Cardio-Facio Cutaneous Syndrome (CFC Syndrome), a rare genetic condition. Undeterred, Marcus set his own challenge, learning to ride a specially adapted trike to ride 30 miles, one per day, around the school playground. James Lunn said: "It was a huge honour for us to receive the award and wonderful to experience this in the setting of the House of Lords. We were so humbled to hear the incredible stories of the other medallists and it has inspired us to do more for our community."

Jenna Potter, Headteacher, added: "As the Headteacher of a large secondary school and sixth form college, I am constantly reminded that young people are such a force for good. The three boys exemplify everything that we would wish to be ourselves, as adults - thoughtful, generous, respectful and determined. It is a privilege to have them in our school and I am delighted to see them being rewarded for their efforts."

In our fifth year working with Panathlon, we were delighted to host the primary event recently. We are pleased to welcome **Emily Treweek**, **Year 13 student**, to report on the event.

This is the fourth Panathlon I have been involved in and every time I am blown away by the enthusiasm of both the leaders and the children that attend. At the October event, four teams from Mowbray School took part and later in the afternoon another Panathlon was held at the Dales School in Morton-on-Swale. This Panathlon was held for primary school children and 10 Richmond Sixth Form leaders helped to run the day as smoothly as possible. Leading these events is a huge learning curve for the sports leaders as they have to learn to adapt activities on the spot to suit the needs of the child. The event is hugely beneficial for the children as they have to put their team-working skills in to practice and learn to interact with others.

A spark was initially ignited in me when I tail ran in a primary cross-country race with a 10-year-old girl who has Down's syndrome. This spark then grew bigger and bigger through helping at Panathlons, so much so that I completed my Year 12 work experience week at Mowbray School. I am hoping to complete a gap year working at a variety of different disability sports events. After this, my aim is to study a sports physical education degree, with the hope of becoming a PE teacher in a special educational needs school in the future.

Here they tell us about their experiences and why they believe NCS is a great project to get involved in. Rishi Sunak MP heard about the great work of NCS and wanted to visit a group during their community project — he chose Joe and Nick's group because their idea was so clever and different to the others. Why did you chosse to take part in NCS? I chose to take part in NCS because not only would it look great on my CV, but it would be something fun to do during the summer holidays with my friends. (Nick) What did you do in the first week? We went to Wales and took part in many group activities such as bush craft, group paddle boarding, kayaking, expeditions and catapult building which all helped us bond as a group. (Joe)

What happened in the second week? Week two was all about learning new skills and planning for week three. We learnt: first aid, public speaking, debate skills, problem solving and environmental impact. Towards the end of the week we started concentrating on organising our social action project. We came up with a plan and assessed the sustainability and legacy of the project and then presented it in a dragon's den pitch at the end of the week. (Nick)

Tell us about your social action plan in week three? We needed to raise the money for the project and then carry it out over a period of at least 30 hours. We started on the first day with a penny mile, which allowed us to raise over £300 in just the first day. In the following days we held bake sales and a sponsored swim to get the total up to £500. This allowed us to buy a piano for Rosedale care home in Catterick, with enough spare to buy a new home for their new rabbits. Overall, we were very pleased with the outcome of the project because it will leave a lasting legacy of the hard work and dedication of our group. (Nick)

How did you come up with the idea? After a day of throwing ideas at each other that just wouldn't work I came up with the idea of giving a piano to a care home because of the long lasting legacy of the idea. It was a unique idea compared to a lot of other groups in the past. (Joe)

Would you recommend NCS to Year 11 students? Overall NCS was a great opportunity, through which I met new friends and made my community a better place. I am very glad that I chose to take part. (Nick)

What benefits do you think it brought to the residents of the home? We hope that both our initial playing of the piano and the rest of our group going around talking to the residents brought joy to the residents and if the piano is played by the residents or visitors that it will bring them happiness again. We also hoped that the piano may spark a lost memory for one of the residents. (Joe)

Well done to Nick, Joe and all the other students who supported the community.

A final note from alumna Lucy Lundberg who worked as an NCS leader and said: "The NCS programme is a great way to spend the summer holidays a little differently, with each phase holding new challenges which young people are supported through, culminating with a team community project, planned and led by themselves. Throughout the three weeks, I saw young people gain independence, learn new skills and, most rewarding of all, grow in confidence."

MAGNIFICENT SEVEN COMPLETE THE GREAT NORTH RUN!

Five members of staff and two students successfully completed the Great North Run and, in doing so, achieved personal bests and donated over £2,800 to Bowel Cancer UK, Cancer Research and The Sick Children's Trust. Not forgetting the essential behind-the-scenes support staff, Clare Clish completed her third year as a volunteer.

A year ago, Charlotte Rogerson, Sam Weston and Victoria Roberts were non-runners but after joining the Swaledale Shufflers and the Couch to 5k running programme (C25k) they decided to go a few steps further (in fact 16km further!) and take up the challenge of the Great North Run.

Sam was fundraising for The Sick Children's Trust who provide accommodation for families while their children are in hospital. Sam's family stayed at Crawford House for four months when her son, Marcus, was in hospital as a baby.

Victoria, who was running to support Bowel Cancer UK and achieved a time of 2.49, said: "Despite a variety of injuries along the way, we kept each other going and most importantly, kept on laughing and having fun together." Having lost her father and her mother-in-law and father-in-law to cancer, Charlotte Rogerson ran for Cancer Research. She has a number of friends who are battling cancer and so it's a charity that is very close to her heart.

Sarah Pike had never done the Great North Run. She had such a great time that she would love to do it again. Her time was 2:19. She was hoping to come in at around 2:30 so was really pleased with her achievement. Alex Withington-Wray also completed the race in a fabulous time of 2.01 and was running for Cancer Research UK.



Andie Jones, in Year 13, was inspired to do the Great North Run by her Dad, Andie said: "My Dad has always been my role model when it comes to sport so taking part in the GNR was something I've always wanted to do. It was one of the hardest things I've ever done but has also been one of the most rewarding. I chose to run for 'St. Oswald's Hospice' as they are an amazing charity and do amazing work."

Ollie has always enjoyed running and has been running with Richmond & Zetland Harriers for just over a year. He keeps going from strength to strength."

YEAR 9 CTEC SPORT STUDENTS START THEIR LEADERSHIP JOURNEY

Congratulations to the fifty Year 9 students studying CTEC Sport who have started their journey as sports leaders. The students have been exploring the characteristics of good sports leadership in lesson time and then put this to the test by leading at a Key Stage 1 multi-skills festival.



The leaders took charge of 315 primary pupils, aged between four and seven, from nine of our local primary schools and coached them in a range of running, jumping and throwing multi-skill activities. The leaders received a lot of positive feedback which will give them confidence as they continue in their roles as sports leaders. They have many more events this year including tag rugby and hockey competitions.

RICHMONDSHIRE CROSS-COUNTRY SUCCESS

Richmond School hosted a Key Stage 2 cross-country competition event which saw 33 local Primary Schools in attendance, translating to approximately 950 pupils running around our challenging course.



The competition was supported by our Sports Leaders who had to independently manage groups of up to 300 pupils in the warm-up area, take charge of excited pupils at the starting point to begin the race safely, and efficiently manage the finish line to ensure all pupils' finishing positions were recorded correctly.

They were also key to celebrating the pupils' achievements as they crossed the line, as well as marshal and hare the event to ensure all pupils knew where to run. The event was a huge success which is largely down to the effectiveness of our sports leaders.

GOING ON PATROL - A career in the Police Force is on the cards for four of our students. Ben Dowson is planning a degree apprenticeship in professional policing through North Yorkshire Police. Whilst studying hard for his A-levels, achieving excellent grades of ABB in Maths, Biology and History, Ben devoted a significant amount of his time to work as a Police Cadet. Ben said: "I have thoroughly enjoyed life at Richmond School and my positive relationships with my teachers have helped enormously."

During the summer holidays, Ben volunteered to go on deployment with the police to support victims of the flash floods in Swaledale. Working with Ellie Lonsdale, a Year 13 student, Ben helped a resident in Reeth to move belongings out of the house and clear the garden of debris. Both Ben and Ellie showed such a positive work ethic, which also reflects Richmond School values of independence, teamwork, resilience and respect.

Ben also spent a week on work experience with North Yorkshire Police in July 2019. This was a very competitive programme with a selection process. Daniel Sharp, from Year 11, also gained a place which is a very impressive feat at such a young age. Since attending the programme, Dan has also been accepted into the Police Cadets following a formal interview process. Hannah Speakman from Year 13 also aims to join the Police; she will be starting at Edge Hill

University, where she will be studying a degree in Professional Policing. Her grades of Distinction* and Distinction in her Level 3 Cambridge Technical Diploma & Physical Activity and Merit in Health & Social Care CTEC demonstrate her strong work ethic and she is well admired by staff and students alike for her exceptional communication and teamwork skills.

Ms Mannion, Careers Leader, said, "Ben, Hannah, Dan and Ellie have really impressed me with their dedication to a career in policing. The Government has committed to creating 20,000 new roles in the Police Service and our students are developing the skills and experience to equip them for the challenges ahead."





LUKE PROTECTS HIS POLE POSITION



Luke Constantine, in Year 11, recently competed in rounds 5 and 6 of the British Junior Rallycross
Championship at Pembrey in South Wales. Luke had a great day on the Saturday and managed to win all but one race and take the win, putting him back in the championship lead going into round 6 on the Sunday. After a great start, Luke took the lead going into the first corner. On the last lap Luke came under pressure from another competitor and received contact from behind which damaged his car, pushing him wide. Luke dropped down to 2nd place and the other competitor was penalised. After a lengthy appeal the decision was overturned. This means that Luke still leads the championship but he is now on the same points as another driver going into the last two rounds at Croft, Luke's home circuit, on 26th and 27th October, when we will see if he will be crowned British Champion!!


Following a long journey to Lydden Hill near Dover, Luke went on to compete in round 7 of the BTRDA Clubmans' Rallycross Championship. Going into heat 1, he fought his way through the pack as he had a grid position on the back row and managed to get up to 2nd when the car ground to a halt on the far side of the circuit which meant a non-finish which wasn't good! The lads from Victoria Garage quickly diagnosed the problem to a loose wire on the battery, which they then fixed. Luke then had it all to do and went out in heat 2 and took the win. Again in heat 3 he started on the back row and managed to fight his way through to take 2nd, putting him on the front row for the final where he lined up 2nd. He had a great start and led into the first corner where he didn't give up his lead and took the win, meaning he has won every round this year and takes the championship lead into the last round at Knockhill in Scotland at the end of October.

I also represented Yorkshire for two games. In my third year at York, I captained the University women's rugby team where my position was anywhere in the front row, loose

The Leeds Leos girls fancied a little extra fitness over the summer so the majority of us signed up for Leeds Akies Rugby League Club and that is where my passion came for rugby league, having followed and watched Leeds Rhinos since I was a toddler. I then had the opportunity to try out for GB Teachers and was delighted to play two seasons for them. Qualifying for the first time for the Welsh Nationals, Aaron swam in five events, making two finals and was reserve for another final. He came away with the bronze medal for the boys' 16-year-old 200m butterfly. A relatively late starter to the swimming competition arena, Aaron only joined Richmond Dales AS Club in



2014 but has quickly shown his prowess. This is down to his commitment to the sport, he even goes back to the pool on Sunday evening as a volunteer to assist one of the coaches.

Georgia also brought back a bronze medal from the Welsh Nationals for the 200m backstroke. She has been swimming competitively since she joined Richmond Dales seven years ago. In addition, Georgia competes once a month for a full weekend, at events all over the country.

Daniel reached the finals of two events at the Welsh Nationals. He competed in the 1500m, with a 5th place and personal best as well as the 400m freestyle, missing out on third place by just 0.3 seconds, with another personal best. Daniel has been competing with Richmond Dales since he was nine years old, initially to improve his swimming in triathlon, then just swimming.

Other highlights of the trip included a moving ceremony at the Menin Gate in Ypres and visits to sites connected with the 1916 Battle of the Somme, as well as the memorial of the missing at Thiepval. This was an incredibly moving experience, especially for those students who managed to find their own relatives remembered among the 72,337 names. A DAY TO REMEMBER WITH THE GREEN HOWARDS

Year 9 GCSE History students learned about the First World War in a unique way, when Carl Watts, the Education Officer at the Green Howards Museum in Richmond, brought some original artefacts into their lessons. The students began by trying on a modern uniform and comparing it to a First World War soldier's uniform, noticing especially the weight and materials used.

They handled German and English helmets from different stages of the war, as well as some of the weapons used such as a grenade, or as it was known then, a bomb! Students were particularly interested to read the beautiful postcards sent home by soldiers and the whole experience gave them a real insight into the lives and conditions for soldiers in the trenches. The students impressed staff particularly with the ideas they gave and questions they asked. It was a fantastic opportunity to learn about the experiences of trench life and the Green Howards regiment.

Year 13 Geographers undertook several investigations around the North of England ranging from Hornsea to Redcar, Arkengarthdale to Guisborough. The investigations were designed and developed to allow the students to collect their own fieldwork data which will be used in their Non Examined Assessment later this year.

Following Mrs House and Mr Hedley's demonstration of data collection techniques at the first sites, students then worked in small groups of to collect their own data. Upon returning to school, the data will be presented, analysed and evaluated independently in a 4000 word report, which will be assessed and contribute 20% towards their final A-level grade. All students were an absolute credit to both the Geography department and Richmond Sixth Form College.



A SUCCESSFUL SIXTH FORM OPEN EVENING

Hundreds of Year 11 students and their families were welcomed to our successful Sixth Form open evening. Alana Hodgson, Headgirl, and Subin Pariyar, Deputy Headboy, set the scene by sharing their positive experiences of Sixth Form, as well as highlighting the many opportunities that are on offer. From debating club to drama, Duke of Edinburgh to dance, there is a wide-ranging and extensive line-up of enrichment and extra-curricular experiences.

They also explained that a major benefit of being part of the wider school is the potential to mentor younger students or lead groups. This can take many forms, from assisting or leading a club, such as a sport or performing arts, to helping students with their reading.

During the evening, visitors were free to look around the Sixth Form College where staff and student ambassadors were on hand to provide information and advice, answering subject-specific questions about course content and transition queries and sharing their experiences of college.





As well as a number of demonstrations and interactive activities taking place in labs and classrooms, the award-winning Careers team were available to talk about progression routes to higher education, apprenticeships and employment, as well as the fantastic work experience placements offered to Year 12 students.



During Subin's presentation he said:" When exploring the Sixth Form, I was presented with a smaller community than the one I had grown so used to. However, if you are like me and flourish in an intimate working environment, Sixth Form would be perfect for you. This means that the teachers and other Sixth Form staff know us well and are always able to support us positively, allowing a style of teaching that is amazingly attentive to the individual. The lessons are planned to challenge us at all times, but there is lots of help on offer should we need it."

Subin summed up the Sixth Form perfectly, saying: "Leaving school and starting your A-levels can be tricky. At Richmond, everyone can stand out and build on their own merits. Everyone is made to feel welcome immediately and I promise that you'll fit in straight away – because everyone will be starting something new."





Young sports leaders were privileged to line out with four-times Six Nations winner and World Cup Silver Medallist, Katy Storie. Katy worked with a group of 52 Year 9 Level 2 Cambridge National Certificate in Sports Science students, who have just started the brand new course this year. Throughout Year 9, students will develop their leadership, coaching and officiating skills to gain leadership qualifications in rugby and Quicksticks hockey. The visit was part of the 'Activity for All' National Lottery Community Fund bid secured by Yes@RichmondSchool. Katy is a Youth Sport Trust athlete mentor who encourages the engagement of students in sport.

The aim of Katy's visit was for her to share her experiences and motivate the students to think about the direction of their future lives, many of which involve aspirations to be professional elite athletes, coaches and fitness instructors in a wide range of sports and physical activities. Katy engaged the students with her life story, from early childhood and struggles with self-esteem and fitting in as a young person, before her introduction to weightlifting for Great Britain and her subsequent and very successful transition to university rugby and then the England team. Katy commented: "It is always a pleasure to spend time with students who really appreciate the benefits of sport, not just the physical and health advantages but the importance of teamwork, coaching and pushing yourself to be the best you can be. The students were engaged with the messages I shared from my own experiences and I hope will use these in their own pathways."

The Physics department has run a trip to Geneva for the last two years but invited the French department to join them to give more students the opportunity to benefit from the amazing opportunity. Mrs Harrison, Physics Teacher, said: "It was the most jam-packed trip we have ever run to Geneva. Mrs Norman has been hugely instrumental in adding to the itinerary and has made it so memorable for all of us"



The first day started at the Parc Mon Repos where the students took in the views across Lake Geneva. On the way they discovered a small sandy beach for a quick paddle. Ice-cream was obviously the next stop and the first real opportunity to use their French - thank goodness for the A-level French students being able to translate the huge variety of flavours.

Day two was a 6.30 start for the visit to CERN – a center for scientific excellence. The students spent the morning finding out about the collaborative nature of CERN and its discoveries, including the Higgs Boson. They visited the data centre and the Antimatter Factory to learn about the new G-bar experiment they will be conducting in the future.

On the third day the Physics and French students went their separate ways for the morning. Physics returned to CERN to take part in the S-cool labs where we became particle hunters and built cloud chambers. The French students travelled into France and visited Voltaire's chateau, the place where this French philosopher wrote his last essays on tolerance and freedom of speech. We then all met up again after lunch to visit the United Nations. We experienced "human rights" being defended at the United Nations and attended a world delegates' conference. The evening was a friendly game of bowling where it was discovered Mrs Norman had been hiding a secret talent!

On the final day, the French students were up early to sample the Swiss gastronomy during a guided visit of a covered market before joining back with the rest of the group to explore the old town and the beautiful views at the top of the cathedral.

Lucy Turner said: "Going to Geneva with my A-level French class has to be one of the best experiences I've had in my college and school years. A highlight of mine has to be our visit to the United Nations and witnessing all of the amazing work they do there."

SUPREME DECISION BY RICHMOND SCHOOL ALUMNA

We are immensely proud of our Alumna, Baroness Hale of Richmond who, as President of the Supreme Court, has made history in the recent ruling about the unlawful suspension of parliament. Baroness Hale said the unanimous decision of the 11 justices meant Parliament had effectively not been prorogued. The Supreme Court is the highest court in the UK. The judges, known as justices, have the final say on the biggest legal issues and are the ultimate check and balance on the UK's laws and constitution.

Baroness Hale attended Richmond School and went on to study at Cambridge, before teaching law at Manchester University from 1966 to 1984. She qualified as a barrister and in 1984 was the first woman to be appointed to the Law Commission. In 1994, she became a High Court judge and, in 1999, became the second woman to be promoted to the Court of Appeal, before becoming the first woman Law Lord. We are very privileged that Baroness Hale retains her links with Richmond School and were delighted when she visited last October to speak to our students.

WORLD-LEADING FORENSICS EXPERT GOES BACK TO SCHOOL

One of the world's leading forensics experts inspired over 600 students when she came back to Richmond School to talk about her career and achievements. Alumna Professor Sarah Hainsworth OBE FREng was appointed an Officer of the Order of the British Empire for her services to Engineering and Forensic Science in the 2019 New Year Honours List.

It was thanks to the Darlington & Stockton Times that this very special visit was made possible. In January, the paper reported that Professor Hainsworth had been awarded the OBE. This led to an ex-classmate, and member of staff at



Richmond School, spotting the feature and getting in touch, 33 years after they left school, and inviting Professor Hainsworth to talk to the students.

Professor Hainsworth is a Pro-Vice-Chancellor and Executive Dean of the School of Engineering and Applied Science at Aston University and a Professor of Materials and Forensic Engineering. She spoke to students in Years 9, 10, 12 and 13 about the diversity of her work, explaining that Engineering is everywhere, leaving them in no doubt that there are opportunities in virtually every field of work. She opened her presentation with a press cutting from the Northern Echo in 1985 when she was involved in a BBC-run competition at Richmond Sixth Form college where students saved and recycled plastic cups to create a swan, winning an Acorn computer!





Professor Hainsworth is a Forensic Science expert in stabbing and dismemberment. The students were especially intrigued by her role in establishing how King Richard III died, by examining and analysing the wound marks on his skull and relating these to the weapons that were likely to have caused them. She issued 3D glasses to the students so they could get a visual interpretation of the skull and the forensic analysis carried out.

Lauren Bastow, Year 13 student, said: "I found the presentation really interesting, the amazing variety of work that Professor Hainsworth has been involved in really demonstrates the huge scope of career opportunities within Engineering that I didn't realise there could be. I'm hoping to study Psychology at university and, having seen Professor Hainsworth's work in Forensics, it has inspired me to consider Forensic Psychology as a future career."

Professor Hainsworth said: "It was lovely to be back at Richmond and see the new buildings and the vibrant learning environment. Engaging with the current Richmond students was a great experience and hopefully it may inspire them to think about Engineering as a career."

Susan Thornton, STEM Co-ordinator, concluded: "We were delighted that Professor Hainsworth was able to take time out of her busy schedule to talk to our students about her career and the possibilities open to them. This inspirational talk from an ex-student has really motivated our students in the many areas of STEM."
