
NEW YOUTH CLUB IN RICHMOND

LEADING WEST-END ACTORS PUT DRAMA STUDENTS THROUGH THEIR PACES

After recently seeing the West-End tour of Willy Russell's 'Blood Brothers' at York Grand Opera House, 47 Year 10 and Year 11 GCSE Drama students relived the spirited lives of seven-year-old Liverpudlian characters. The students spent the day participating in a professional masterclass on the set text of Blood Brothers to support them in the written component of their GCSE Drama studies.

The masterclass was led by Mike Southern and Steve Palfreman who co-founded Stage-ed. Palfreman is one of the longest-running leading men in London's West End with his renowned performance as 'Mickey' in the multi-award-winning musical Blood Brothers, which he portrayed for nearly two decades. Southern is known for his role of 'Sammy' in Blood Brothers in the West End which he played for ten years, as well as a year on the UK National tour.

Mike and Steve's expertise of the students' set text allowed them to explore the musical, looking in depth at the character work and investigating the challenges presented to an actor when having to play various ages from seven-year-old upwards. Students were put through their paces when reading through an ensemble scene from the show and went on to block, rehearse, and finally perform the scene. The masterclass allowed students to

block the beginning of the show to the ghostly, macabre feeling overture and then as the mood changed as they seamlessly went in to 'Marilyn Monroe' where the group livened the atmosphere to portray the drunk wedding guests.

Steve and Mike gave the students a light-hearted look at the Liverpool accent which allowed them to then try out their new 'scouse' tongue on Mickey's 'I wish I was our Sammy' poem. The rest of the session allowed students to explore key scenes relating to the play, looking at the tension, suspense and comedy within the play.





The session finished with a question and answer opportunity that gave students the chance to ask what it is like appearing on a West End stage, how the audition process works, and what route is best to take when considering training in the industry. The session also allowed the actors to talk about their performance choices with a view to helping students on the exam paper.

Mr Birdsall, Drama teacher, said: "The students really benefitted from the professional masterclass that was led so effortlessly by Mike and Steve from Stage-ed. They thoroughly enjoyed the process and it was lovely to see them practically engaging so deeply in a timeless text that they will write about in their written exam at the end of the course.





"The students have been armed with a plethora of skills and techniques, as well as a greater confidence in their knowledge and understanding of Blood Brothers in terms of staging, direction, characterisation and a particular focus on vocalisation. They can now clearly relate their practical exploration to how to successfully answer their exam questions due to the interactive and physical workshop, introducing them to the rehearsal process experienced by professional actors.

No performance experience is necessary and everyone is welcome whatever their abilities or confidence levels.



Four talented footballers have been selected to represent North Yorkshire Soccer Academy in the Barcelona International Cup in Salou. Harry Davis, in Year 9, Archie MacLelland and Teddy Brain, in Year 8, and Tom Simpson, in Year 7, will head out to Spain during the half-term holiday to take part in the prestigious competition.

All four students play for the North Yorkshire Soccer Academy and are really looking forward to playing in the international event. The students are also members of other clubs,



with Tom playing for Boro Rangers, Teddy playing for Richmond Town, Harry playing for Leyburn and Archie playing for Northallerton. In the Barcelona Cup, Harry is playing in the U14s, Tom is playing up a year in the U12 squad, Teddy is in the U13s and Archie is playing up a year for the U14s.

The North Yorkshire Soccer Academy Teams are being supported by a team of helpers, including Year 11 students Benjamin Simpson and Harry Parker, who will accompany the players. They will play a vital role with the day-to-day running of the event and helping to motivate the young footballers. Benjamin, also a keen footballer, has previously played in the Barcelona International Cup and continues to play for TIBS Football Club, in Teesside.

Jenna Potter, headteacher, said: "To be selected to play in this high-profile cup is a huge achievement for the boys. It will be a fantastic experience for them, not only to play on an international field but to meet and engage with other students from all over the world. I am sure it will help develop their team-building skills and will be something they will always remember."

GREAT NEWS FOR THE SMART ARCHERS!

Following their gold medals at the Junior National Outdoor Archery Championship in July, brothers Johnny and Bert Smart, in Year 13 and Year 8, competed in the UK Junior Masters competition held at Deer Park Archers in Cheltenham.

To enter this competition, archers need to have attained the standard of Junior Master Bowmen at least three times in competition. This means that unlike other 'open' competitions, the standard is often much higher.

In the recurve competition, Johnny ranked second in the qualification round and made his way into the head-to-head final through a tricky semi-final where he beat one of this year's GB international Youth team. Despite being stung by a bee at 2-4 down, he came back to win 6-4. In the final he was beaten on a one-arrow shoot off having tied at 5-5. Both Johnny and his opponent shot tens and required a measure with the judge's callipers to decide the medals; silver for Johnny by a couple of millimetres - about as close and exciting as archery gets.

Bert competed with the Under 18s in the compound competition and despite being beaten, shot with the very best U18 compound archers in the country and he learnt a lot of useful stuff about himself and his bow. He was knocked out in the quarter final by the eventual winner. He's been shooting very well since his return and is preparing well for the forthcoming Inter-counties match at Eccles where he'll be representing Yorkshire alongside an U18 Youth International archer from Hull.

Johnny had been selected for the county team, however, he has also been selected for the National Age Group Academy and will attend the first winter residential at Lilleshall in October. The new age-group changes to be in line with World Archery mean that from 1st January Johnny becomes Under 21; he has a great chance of getting in the senior county team next year.


BETH SHOOTS TO THE TOP IN COUNTY ARCHERY COMPETITION

Beth Farrow, in Year 11, only took up archery seriously in April 2022 and within six months she has progressed from a beginner to Junior Master Bowman, and has represented North Yorkshire and won all four competitions she has entered!

This is an incredible turn of events for Beth, who most recently scooped first place in the Under 18s Annual Inter-counties' Final, a competition which includes the five regions that make up Northern England.

Beth is a member of Scorton Archers and shoots the recurve style bow, which is the style that was used at the Olympics. Beth's goals for the first year where quite modest; to have some fun, learn how to shoot and get stronger so she could shoot the longer distances and maybe even go to a competition with the hopes of winning a medal. However, she very quickly surpassed all of those!

The first competition she entered, the Durham and Northumberland Region Junior Championships, was in July and despite going up against more experienced archers,



It is phenomenal how in her first year of archery, Beth has made such exceptional progress. In addition, Beth became Lady Club Champion at Scorton, choosing to shoot in the senior category rather than the juniors! This would not have happened without her hard work and effort, training 2-3 times per week and following her coach's advice carefully. It is now the indoor season where Beth will have the chance to compete against archers from across the country at the National Indoor Championships in December and hopefully carry on improving her form for the outdoor season again next year.

Scorton Archers is a very friendly club and welcomes new members, especially families. In reply, Richmond batted steadily, accelerating nicely towards the end of their overs and reaching the target of 80 runs for the loss of just one wicket (Daisy Pyrah 31n.o. and Sophie White 28n.o.)

Tony Potter, Head of Community Sport, said: "This was an excellent team performance from the girls who were delighted with their win against a competitive Ripon team. At the first training session of the season there were only five players and we now have a squad of almost 20, including many who are playing competitive cricket for the first time. This makes their win even more impressive. Many thanks to Richmondshire CC for hosting this final at short notice at the end of a long club season."

The championship takes its name from international cricketer Lauren Winfield- Hill, who currently plays for Yorkshire, Northern Diamonds and England.

JAMIE DEMONSTRATES INCREDIBLE RESILIENCE AT BRITISH BMX CHAMPIONSHIPS

Jamie Hart, in Year 10, competed in the recent British BMX Championships alongside the best riders in the country. Jamie was delighted to qualify for this national event based on his performances throughout the racing season.

BMX racing comprises three 'motos'. These are heats and eight riders race each moto with placings and times for the course recorded. Depending on positions attained in the motos, the rider may or may not progress to quarter-finals, semi-finals and finals.

Jamie's first moto went well. He was excited and hopeful, in the second moto but unfortunately disaster struck - there was a crash! A rider next to Jamie fell and caused him to also crash. Luckily, Jamie didn't go down hard and he was up and back on his bike in less than 10 seconds but by then the other six riders were a long way ahead. Jamie completed the course to a huge cheer from the crowd as everyone there understood how important competing at this level is and a finish is still something to be very proud of.

Jamie lined up for his third moto knowing that it would take a miracle to get past the heats and to the quarter finals. He was racing against top riders, some almost a year older than him. He rode with all his heart but most of the other riders were stronger than him and hadn't suffered a crash. Sadly, he didn't make it to the next rounds but can hold his head up and be very proud of his achievements, nonetheless.

Jamie stayed at the track side to watch the rest of the racing culminating in the finals, cheering all the riders on.

There will be more racing and Jamie will continue to improve and we hope that luck will shine on him next time. The important thing is to be involved and to keep trying, no matter the ups and downs, which in more ways than one is what BMX racing is all about.

When individuals compete in the British BMX championships they are given a special race number for the event. This number shows where they rank in the region and in their age category. The north region is number 4 and Jamie is ranked 3rd in his age category, which is a huge achievement in itself.

The competition has an enviable pedigree. First staged in 1993 and now in its 30th year, the Junior European Open (JEO) is widely regarded as the toughest test in junior golf and is the most keenly contested junior golf tournament in Europe.

The competition will be covered by Sky Sports and 1995 JEO finalist Nick Dougherty. The competition will be hosted at Alcaidesa Links Golf Resort which has two impressive golf courses, with a total of 36 professional holes and spectacular views to the sea.

Josh said: "I am over the moon to have qualified for the Junior European Open. I am looking forward to competing in Spain on some amazing courses and against some of the best players in my age group. I'm sure it will be a fantastic and memorable experience!"

Josh is enrolled with Peak USA and is hoping to be selected by an American University under their scholarship programme. Josh started to play golf when he was 14 years old and plays for Harrogate and District Union team and regularly represents them in the North of England. At college, Josh studies Triple CTEC Sport and aspires to be a professional golfer or to follow a career in the golf or sporting field.

Annabelle loves being a member of the pony and riding clubs and is a great all-rounder, participating in all activities. Annabelle said: "I am really proud of everything I have achieved with Meg. She is a very special pony and we work really well together and have a lot of trust in each other. EMERGENCY SERVICES DELIVER HANDS-ON ROAD SAFETY WORKSHOPS TO STUDENTS

Local Emergency Services Teams delivered a full day of practical road-safety workshops to Sixth Form students to highlight the dangers that are faced every day on the roads.

Over 120 Year 13 students at Richmond Sixth Form College spent a full day attending presentations and hands-on activities with staff from Police, Fire and Ambulance Services, and the Community Alcohol Partnership (CAP).

The day focused on prevention but also on reaction so that the students were aware of what to do if the worst happens while they are out and about. The students attended a carousel of activities, all targeted at raising awareness of how to make their use of the road and foot/bridleway network a safer one.



Mark Bastow, Crew Manger at Richmond Fire Station, said: "Although not a pleasant subject to discuss, all of the students we encountered were engaged and equally answered all of our questions and asked plenty of very relevant questions of their own. We set up a realistic scenario that could happen anywhere and we were very happy that the students willingly and sensibly joined in to learn how their intervention at a real scenario could potentially save lives."

Many of the workshops were interactive. Staff from Richmond Fire Station attended with two fire engines and a host of equipment, including cutting tools. In addition, they brought a car that was seriously damaged in a crash to simulate an accident with staff taking on the roles of an injured driver and passenger, and a casualty who had been hit by a car. Students were taken through the process of how to react and what to do if they came across such an emergency. This included; how to prioritise their actions from assessing the scene, calling 999, reviewing the injuries of the casualties and if it was appropriate for them to administer any basic first aid or trying to make the situation safer.

Ellen Atkinson, Head Girl, said: "I gained new and useful information during the emergency services day on Wednesday. It was extremely relevant to me as next year I am looking to do paramedic science at university so it was a valuable experience to take part in hands-on simulated scenarios."

Staff from the Police Service brought one of their safety camera vans and talked to students about the effects of speeding and the role that distractions have in a road traffic collision. They also spoke about the implications of not following the highway code, as well as instructions on what to do to temporarily manage a road traffic incident until help arrives. In addition, students had the opportunity to step inside the vehicle and see how the cameras work in action.

As well as having the opportunity to do CPR training with the Yorkshire Ambulance Service, the students learned about what to do in the event of injury in an accident. This included emergency first aid, how to calm people down if they are first on 'the scene' and how to keep calm.

The session with the Community Alcohol Partnership team developed students' understanding of the impacts that alcohol and drug misuse can have on road users.

Ian Dawson, co-ordinator of the event and the young driver advocate for the local branch of the Institute of Advanced Motorists, said: "The day was a resounding success. It was an impressive sight to see the students fully engaged in the practical activities with the Fire Brigade and Ambulance Service. This has really helped to drive the message home to the students about the importance of road safety, speed awareness and what to do in the event of an accident."

Sally Byrom, Head of Year, added: "We cannot thank the staff from the Emergency Services enough. To give up their time and to bring so much equipment to demonstrate everything so visually was fantastic. Our students have gained some important knowledge and skills which are relevant to the real world. They are better prepared to help to keep themselves and others safe and be the best that they can be in the event of facing an emergency situation."




ALUMNI PROFILE: STEPH DE'ATH - HEAD OF DANCE SCIENCE

We were thrilled to have the opportunity to do a Q and A with Steph De'Ath. Steph is Head of Dance Science at London Contemporary Dance School where her role involves three main areas of work; healthcare, education and research. Steph offers some fabulous advice for students who are interested in furthering their studies in Dance or Dance Science and considering a career in this field.

When did you first become interested in Dance? My earliest childhood memories revolve around dancing. Since a very young age, I used to love putting on 'performances' for my family (I'd even create pretend tickets for them for the show) and despite being a very shy child, I used to love performing with my dance school or primary school. At 6 years old I have a vivid memory of doing a dance routine to the Spice Girls and realising that music was 'a thing' and something you could enjoy moving to.

When I got to secondary school I realised that dance was more than just for performing, I realised that you can dance for yourself, to experience joy, to explore your body's capabilities, to express emotion or a story. My interest in dance has been ever-changing but it has been a lifelong passion. It's important to note that whilst I started from a young age, which may be typical for some people, I have many friends and colleagues who started dancing in their mid-to-late teens and have had a hugely enjoyable and successful career. You certainly don't need to start dance at an early age to be 'good' at dance.

As a child, did you do classes at a dance school, if so, what genres? From 3 years old I partook in ballet, tap and modern. I took a short break age 10-12 and then continued with ballet and modern. Throughout this time, I worked my way through the RAD (Royal Academy of Dance Exams) and enjoyed taking part in our dance school summer shows.





How did your interest in dance develop at Richmond School and Sixth Form College? My interest in dance developed through two amazing teachers Miss Hargest (now Victoria Sellers) and Mrs Dodds. The passion and dedication they had for dance and for their students was the most infectious energy and something I still try to channel to this day. They made dance so fun that my friends and I never wanted to leave the dance studio! After school or on our lunch break we would be in the studio rehearsing, creating and having fun. At 15, I joined North Yorkshire County Youth Dance Company, which is thanks to Richmond School who brought them in for a workshop. Whilst in the company we travelled to London to take part in a dance festival, which is now called U Dance and run by One Dance UK. Miss Hargest taught us about the many layers of dance, how to create dance and how to care for our dancing bodies. Mrs Dodds taught us how to feel alive whilst performing. My most special memories from Richmond School and Sixth Form College are in the dance studio.

Did you have opportunities to perform at school and how important were these to you? We had many exciting performance opportunities when at school and sixth form. This included the school shows, local dance and arts festivals, and the annual talent show. These were hugely important for exposing us to how a performance is brought together, including backstage and front of house teams. It also nourished our creative ideas and I'm grateful to have been at a school that valued dance and the arts so passionately.

Did you study Dance to A-level? I did study Dance at A-level (and at GCSE too). I found it enjoyable to explore dance through a practical and theoretical lens, and it helped me to gain a deeper understanding of dance works and creating dance.

After your A-levels did you further your studies in Dance, if so, where did you go and what course did you take? When I left Richmond Sixth Form College I went to Middlesex University to study BA(Hons) Dance Performance. This was an exciting time as I was able to move to London and experience the dance culture in London, including the opportunity to go to open classes and to the theatre. The course was situated within the Contemporary dance genre and I felt very well equipped for the course, thanks to my GCSE and A-Level Dance studies at Richmond School.

Please tell us about your career path since you completed your studies—Whilst I was at Middlesex University completing my undergraduate degree, we had a module each year that was called Dance Science. During these modules we would learn about anatomy, nutrition, injury prevention, fitness, and dance psychology. The aim of exploring all these topics was to take care of our dancing bodies by reducing the risk of injury and increase our performance ability. I found these classes fascinating and noticed quite early on that it was one of my favourite classes, which on reflection isn't much of a surprise as at school I really enjoyed my science lessons too. These modules stimulated a lot of curiosity and subsequently I focussed my dissertation on dance injuries amongst university dance students.

During my third year I became aware of the opportunity to study Dance Science at a Postgraduate level and subsequently went on to Trinity Laban Conservatoire of Music and dance the next year to complete an MSc in Dance Science. After this, I was fortunate to do two years as a Dance Science graduate intern at Trinity Laban, which afforded me lots of networking and experience opportunities. I spent the next 8 years as a freelancer, completing research studies looking at how dance impacts people's wellbeing, teaching dance science to dancers in undergraduate training and, after completing a Level 5 diploma with NLSSM, I became a soft tissue therapist work with pre-professional dancers. After this, I was the co-manager of the National Institute of Dance Medicine and Science, which is an organisation supporting UK dancer's health and well-being. Finally, I was able to combine



all this experience into one role as Head of Student Welfare at London Studio Centre for almost 4 years and now, where I currently work, as Head of Dance Science at London Contemporary Dance School.

As you can probably tell, it wasn't a typical career path and I've had what is sometimes called a 'portfolio career'. Whilst I had a general idea of what I was passionate about and where I would like my career to go, I could never have predicted the path that unfolded. This is because there is not a typical pathway into dance science, which should be seen as an exciting opportunity, rather than something intimidating.

Your current position is Head of Dance Science at London Contemporary Dance School, what does this role involve? My current role involves three main areas of work; healthcare, education and research. In terms of healthcare, I manage the healthcare team at London Contemporary Dance School, which includes physiotherapists, a soft tissue therapist, a strength and conditioning coach, and a nutritionist. I am responsible for overseeing all our injury cases and supporting students with any physical development goals they may have, to enhance their training and performance experience. I am fortunate to have the opportunity to teach the students, specifically teaching dance science to our first years. And, I'm very excited to be able to undertake research as part of my role. At the moment we are conducting a long-term research project looking at how to structure the students' training so that they can be at their best, both physically and mentally, whilst trying to reduce the chance of fatigue, burnout or injury. This requires lots of careful planning to ensure that the number of classes they have per day and the intensity of their classes is mapped out over time, to allow the students to peak at

the right moment.

What advice would you give to students who are considering a career in dance?

If you are considering a career in dance or dance science, I would encourage you wholeheartedly. My main advice would be to be openminded about what opportunities await you, as there is so much more to dance than performing and there is so much more to performing than just dancing. Like many things, we only grow when we step outside the boundaries of our comfort zone, so take a risk and share something at your annual talent show, audition for the school play, take part in after-school clubs or workshops. By immersing yourself in lots of different experiences you will be able to broaden your knowledge of dance practice and start to form connections and the beginnings of a professional network. Moreover, you may discover an unexpectedly fun experience!

If you are particularly interested in Dance Science, I would recommend looking at the undergraduate courses offered at Trinity Laban and University of Chichester. They both offer a BSc in Dance Science, which allow you to hone your dance craft whilst exploring and analysing dance through a scientific lens. And of course, I would be amiss to not say, if you are interested in studying Contemporary Dance, I would hugely recommend you looking at London Contemporary Dance School and our BA(Hons) in Contemporary Dance. And if you want to do a masters afterwards, LCDS offers a range of courses! Finally, regardless of where your interests lie across dance, I would advise to not be put off exploring this as a career for fear of it being a challenging or undervalued career pathway. The arts are so valued, and we have seen that demonstrated strongly during the pandemic where we all turned to digital art and theatre to stoke our morale during those difficult times. Audiences were eager to return to theatres once they reopened. Dance needs bold, fearless, passionate young artists, and if you think this sounds like you, there is a whole dance community waiting for you with open arms.



He was also a senior member of the Georgian Theatre Royal Youth Theatre and has a long-standing involvement with Richmond Amateur Dramatic Society.

After A-levels, Ed read Applied Theatre and Community Drama at the Liverpool Institute for Performing Arts (LIPA) and graduated with a First Class

Honours. He then took various film and television roles including a small part in the soon-to-be-released film *Dali Land*, starring Ben Kingsley. He is currently a resident artist with the Newcastle-based company Tatwood Puppets and has had several pieces of creative writing published in literary magazines.

"I am delighted to be taking up this very exciting post and returning to my roots," said Ed. "I really benefitted from my early drama experiences growing up in Richmond, which inspired me to go on and pursue a career in the performing arts.

"Off her own bat, she said she would buy him a hot dinner and took it to him. This is such a caring and respectful thing to do and definitely going above and beyond for others. "


