



LOOKING BACK - EXAM RESULTS: A-LEVELS



RICHMOND SIXTH FORM STUDENTS ACHIEVE 100% PASS RATE.

Over 100 Year 13 students from Richmond Sixth Form College received their A-Level and CTEC results today. The students achieved a 100% pass rate in a wide variety of subjects, a fantastic achievement rewarding the hard work they have put in over the last two years of their sixth form studies.

These results have allowed every single student to progress to the chosen next stage of their lives, be that further academic study at university, starting an employment-based degree apprenticeship, taking a year out to gain employment and life experience, or to move straight into employment. Richmond Sixth Form College is proud to have been a part of the preparation of this cohort of students for their next steps and continue to support their students' wide variety of ambitions and interests.

Every individual's set of results tells a story, but what follows are some particular highlights from this year's results.

Once again, Richmond Sixth Form College has a select number of students who have gained places at Oxbridge. Peter Longstaff, former Head Student, gained two A* grades and an A and will move on to study Geography at the University of Cambridge. Izzy Lundberg, one of Richmond's high-flying linguists, achieved 2 A grades and a B, and is looking forward to starting her French and Russian course at the University of Oxford. Finally, Emma Scott gained an A*, an A and a B, with full marks and an A* in her EPQ and will be moving on to the University of Cambridge to study History.




The CTEC Sport students achieved particular success this year, with Ellen Atkinson, former Head Student, gaining a clean sweep of three Distinction* grades. Ellen has gained a place at Teesside University to study Paramedic Practice, an exceptionally competitive course to gain entry to. Josh Newell, one of the UK's best junior golfers - placing 18th in the 2022 European Open Championship - is another success story. He joined Richmond Sixth Form from Bedale High School and also achieved a clean sweep of three Distinction* grades. He will move on to study Sport and Exercise Science at Durham University. Ellie Spencer gained a Distinction* and two Distinction grades, with Katie Leversuch, who joined Richmond Sixth Form College from Risedale School, achieving two Distinction grades and a Merit. Both of these students will move on to study Sport and Exercise Science, at Edge Hill University and Teesside University respectively.

There was further academic excellence from a wide range of courses, continuing with the CTEC qualifications, but also A-Levels. Cora Aked, a former Deputy Head Student, achieved an exceptional four A* grades and will move on to study Mathematics at the University of St. Andrews. Will Mawer, another former Deputy Head Student earned an A* and two A grades, plus an A* in his Extended Project Qualification. He will be studying Geography at Durham University. Leila Gray, who joined Richmond Sixth Form from SFX, achieved three A grades and an A* in the Extended Project - she's looking forward to starting her Law course at the University of Sheffield.

Amongst many other individual success stories are Ruby Weaver-Cooke, with a Distinction* and two Distinction grades - she's going into a gap year and Lydia Cooper, who joined from SFX, with two A grades and a Distinction*. Lydia will be joining York St. John University to study Occupational Therapy. Continuing the diversity of our students' destinations, Florence Quinton-Bottley has earned a place at the University of Central Lancashire to study Veterinary Medicine and Surgery.

Another rich vein of success for Richmond Sixth Form this year was the number of students who managed to gain places on degree apprenticeships, highly competitive courses with a balance between undergraduate study and employment. Alana Teasdale has a place as a Chartered Rural Surveyor apprentice at Bell Ingram in Thirsk. Ross Wheatley will join Chipchase Manners as an Accountancy apprentice and Jacob Moore will take up his position as a Civil and Structural Engineering apprentice at Align Property Partners, Northallerton. Finally, Harry Laviolette starts as an apprentice Architectural Technician at WardmanBrown, Darlington.

Further standout stories include a number of students who have secured success on courses that will give them access to the highly competitive world of film, television, media and music. Poppy Mortimer will start her Television and Radio Production course at the University of Salford in 2024, after taking a gap year. Alice Brown will also be heading to the University of Salford to study Film Production. Edie Heringman, one of Richmond's outstanding musicians, is heading to SOAS University of London to study Music and World Philosophies and Freya Millar will be taking up a course in Music Production at Leeds Beckett University.

Jenna Potter, Head Teacher at Richmond School and Sixth Form College, congratulated the students on their success: "This cohort of students were not able to sit their GCSE exams because of Covid, so these are the first public exams they have experienced. It makes us very proud to see that these students have risen to this challenge and demonstrated resilience and determination to achieve what they have. To be in a situation where every single student is moving on to their chosen destination, without anyone having to resort to the UCAS clearing system, is absolutely fantastic. We wish our students all the very best with the next steps of their lives, and look forward to staying in touch with many of them as their successes continue."



HARD WORK REWARDED FOR RICHMOND SCHOOL'S GCSE STUDENTS.

Today was a big day for the future of Richmond School's Year 11 cohort as over 200 students received their GCSE and CTEC results. This is the first time since 2019 that the results have been awarded using the same standards as before the pandemic, so parents, students and staff awaited these results with perhaps a little more trepidation than in the past.

Once again however, the students have outdone themselves. Results were strong across the board, with particular highlights this year in maths, science and engineering - subjects that will give students excellent opportunities for successful progression further on in their lives.

Richmond School's high standards in French and German continued, with excellent results reflecting the school's status as a PASCH school - gaining exclusive academic and extracurricular support from the Goethe Institut in Germany.

Students also performed well in the core subjects of the English Baccalaureate (EBacc) as well as in Art, demonstrating strength across a wide range of subjects.

There were inumerable examples of personal success, but some particular highlights follow.

Niamh Hyman achieved eight top grade 9s and one grade 8. Tabitha Aston and Harry Sellers achieved six grade 9s, with Anna-Rosie Scott Hall gaining four. Murray Duncan, Tom Grigg and Ethan Stewart received three apiece.

There are so many other accounts of success to share - individual stories and journeys through Year 11 culminating in superb results. Kirsty Tarran, recently returned from an international Scout Camp, gained two grade 9s and a collection of 7s and 8s. Sanskriti Thapa achieved four grade 8s, with Elsa Wright earning a grade 9, an 8 and five 7s. Ellis Hepper scored a grade 9, three 8s and a 7. The previous two students were both Student Leaders, with Ellis giving high quality support on the technical side of the school's productions. Noah Edwards achieved an excellent, consistent set of grade 7s and 6s and also found time to support the school's drama productions - a particular highlight being his Cheshire Cat in the recent pantomime! Will Hume, one of the school's outstanding musicians, gained a brilliant collection of grade 7s, 8s and a 9 - results he should be very proud of. All of these students are likely to return to Richmond Sixth Form College to continue their studies and the fantastic contribution they have already made.

For some students, GCSE results herald a different route - the world of training and employment. Once again, a number of students have been successful in securing a place on an apprenticeship. Harry Crossland achieved a great, consistent set of results, especially in the core subjects and will be starting an apprenticeship with the local firm BSA Electrics run by Luke Boston, an alumnus of the school. Elsa Byrne-Parr will be starting a Level 3 course in Equine Management at Askham Bryan College and Kieran Knights will be moving to Park Academy in Chester-le-Street where he has earned a scholarship to continue his rise through the ranks of junior rugby talent.

ECO CLUB REACHES FINAL FIVE OF 'ACTION IN THE COMMUNITY' AWARD.

We have been shortlisted to the final five for the award out of 150 other community groups in the local area, including businesses and community action groups. Richmond School's Eco Club is the only school in the category and as a result moving forward, a new category has been created for schools specifically following our nomination.

This week the Eco Club met with the judging panel to find out more about the work they've done on the school site and with the local community, including our tree planting and biodiversity work. It is brilliant to see the hard work of our group being recognised in the local area and fingers crossed we win!

AARON WINS MEDAL AT BRITISH TRANSPLANT GAMES

Less than a year after receiving a liver transplant, Aaron Lawrence, a Richmond School student in Year 8, not only took part in the annual Westfield Health British Transplant Games, but came away with a silver medal in the 50m backstroke swimming event. This was an absolutely fantastic achievement for Aaron, not just because of the challenges associated with the transplant, but also because this was his first time in any sort of sporting competition.

Aaron was part of the Children's Team from Leeds Children's Hospital – the hospital that he has been visiting for treatment all of his life – also where he received his transplant. Over 40 transplant recipients from the hospital took part in the games, which were hosted in Coventry this year. The games have been running for over 40 years and the four day event attracts around 1000 transplant athletes and more than 1700 supporters.

The children and their families were asked to raise £300 each to contribute to the considerable expense of running and taking part in the games. Aaron's family set themselves a target of £1000. They ended up raising well over this sum, with contributions from a wide range of people – including some from Richmond School after Aaron's story was published on the school's website and social media – thank you!

After the Opening Ceremony, Aaron took part in a number of events including the long jump, the obstacle race and the 50m backstroke in the pool. He performed brilliantly in all the events he entered and won a silver medal in the swimming. Mrs. Lawrence, Aaron's mum said: "It was very overwhelming. It was an Olympic 50m pool – exactly like the Olympics, and there were over 200 people watching!"

One of the final events was the Donor Run – an event where both recipients of transplants take part, but also members of donor families. This was a fun event, with people dressing up in all sorts of costumes – Aaron was particularly impressed by the Minions and the bananas! The run was also a very emotional event, with many of the donor families having lost loved ones to provide transplant recipients with the organs that in many cases have saved their lives.



The event also provided an opportunity for the families of other children with Aaron's very rare metabolic condition – Ornithine Transcarbamylase Deficiency – to meet up. This had previously only happened online. Mrs. Lawrence said: "I knew of a few of the families but had never met them. In our team there were three children with the same disorder – which is amazing because it only affects one in 70,000 people!"

Four days of competitive sport, mass participation events, social gatherings and much more came to a close with a Gala Dinner for all the participants.

Congratulations to Aaron for showing the determination and independence needed to compete in the games – this was a long way beyond his comfort zone and amazingly less than a year since his transplant. Well done also to Aaron, his family, plus the other competitors and their families for coming together and showing an incredible level of teamwork. This was not just to make a success of the British Transplant Games, but also to make a success of supporting a child through the challenges of living with poor health before a transplant, receiving the transplant and the ongoing support that will be needed in the future.

We look forward to hearing about Aaron's progress both at school in Year 8 and as a transplant athlete – Aaron has a cupboard full of official kit that he fully intends to wear at next year's games in Nottingham!



STUDENTS CELEBRATE THEIR NATIONAL WINNING POETRY AT THE MINISTRY OF DEFENCE

Award-winning poetry created by a group of Service Students and their peers from Richmond School and Sixth Form College has been displayed in the Ministry of Defence building in London. The students' thought-provoking poetry was crowned the winner of the 'Month of the Military Child' design competition, a national event organised by the charity Never Such Innocence which included submissions of poetry, music and artwork.

Following on from our poetry submission from Month of the Military Child, two of the students, from Years 9 and 10, were invited to the Ministry of Defence HQ in Whitehall where copies of the work from all the 2023 competition entries were exhibited for general viewing by military personnel and visitors. El Hughes (Year 10) won the poetry civilian category for her age and Sophie Andrews (Year 9) won the army poetry category for her age group. The students' work was displayed proudly and Katie Salari, Chief Operating Officer of Never Such Innocence, spoke about the significance of the event, introduced the artwork and allowed the category winners to read their award winning work.

Sophie and El read their poetry clearly and eloquently to a room full of VIP guests and attendees. In attendance was NSI Founder, Lady Lucy French, Head of Education at MOD, Andrew Malcolm. Brigadier Kristen Dagless, representing the Army; Air Commodore Alan Opie, representing the Royal Air Force; and Commodore Rich Harris, representing the Royal Navy. Minister for Defence People, Veterans and Service Families, Dr Andrew Murrison.



Hearing different poems and seeing art made by armed forces children and other civilians helped me to really understand the stories of different people."

Twenty-two service students and their peers have designed and created some stunning poppy inspired mandalas which will be displayed around the altar at the Festival of Remembrance at Ripon Cathedral on 14th November 2023.

The aim of the workshop was to create the poppy-inspired mandalas by using paint and dotting tools to create intricate patterns. As part of the session students looked at the history and importance of the poppy as well as having the opportunity to talk to fellow service students and peers about what remembrance means to them.

Mr Birdsall, Richmond School and Sixth Forms Service Children's Advocate, said: "The students worked really hard throughout the workshop and have created some stunning designs which I can't wait to see on display in Ripon Cathedral. They have really embraced the significance of their work and It was great seeing service students and their peers from different years talking and collaborating on such a lovely project.

'BOOTPLANTS' - THE FINAL CHAPTER

Earlier this summer, Richmond School Year 9 students brought their successful journey through the Premier League Inspire's 'Protect the Planet' challenge to a close.

The journey started back in March when 23 students visited Middlesbrough Football Club to present their ideas to a judging panel in the regional heats of the challenge. Ashley Watson, Emmee May Michael, Lily-Mae McCafferty and Josh Crossland's group won this stage of the competition. Their idea was to collect donations of unwanted football boots, fill them with compost and plant them with a small houseplant. They would then set up a 'Bootplant' room where the upcycled planters would make a green space filled with plants. Any boots in good enough condition could be passed on to those unable to afford new ones.

In May the Bootplant team visited Middlesbrough FC again for a development workshop in preparation for the next stage of the challenge.

In July, the team once again travelled to Middlesbrough and represented the club for a gathering of all schools that had made the regional finals. Sheffield United, Huddersfield Town and Doncaster Rovers were also represented. They had the opportunity to present their finished ideas to representatives from the Premier League and the other finalists, as well as taking a tour of the Riverside stadium.

Finally, later on in July, the team of students made the Bootplants using the football boots they had collected and offered them for sale to staff at Richmond School. As you can imagine they sold like hot cakes and very soon there were none left!


The pass out parade involved the cadets showcasing some of the skills they have learned over the past two years to parents, family and dignitaries, followed by a presentation to reward all their hard work.

JACK EARNS SECOND ENGLAND CAP IN YOUTH INTERNATIONAL FLY FISHING CHAMPIONSHIPS

Even though Jack Blakey is only in Year 8, he's been fishing for a long time - over seven years. Fishing runs in the Blakey family! He first started float fishing using scented bait, then moved on to the more dynamic sport of fly fishing. Jack said: "You have to cast a fly all the time, then wait until you can see the fish, then you strike - it's the best feeling!" As time went on, Jack's experience with this very technical sport increased - Jack's knowledge of line weights, different types of fly and rod, and the strategies used in the sport is encyclopaedic! He kept at it until he was eventually chosen to represent England in the England Youth Fly Fishing Team.

The first time Jack represented England was last year when the team - with their families in support - travelled to Ireland. On this occasion, England came second.

This summer Jack was once again selected for the team and travelled to a lake called Llyn Clywedog in Wales. Jack had a couple of practice days out on the water in a boat with his unofficial coach - his dad - before the official team practice days. These days involved the whole squad as well as coach and sponsor Craig Barr.

After the practice days, it was final time - a full day on the water in a boat with two fishermen and a boatman. The atmosphere was electric as the teams paraded down to their allocated boats, accompanied by a bagpipe player to provide extra suspense! No contact between the boats and the shore teams was allowed on the day - it was now all down to the skill of the fishermen - with maybe a little bit of luck...

Families and support crew waited nervously on the shore until 4pm when the boats returned. Each fisherman had done their best to catch as many fish as possible. The prizes were determined by weighing the first two fish caught - any further fish had to be released - and taking into account how many fish each angler caught. The teams waited as the results were processed. The winning team would have the privilege of the traditional celebration of jumping off the pontoons into the water - Jack's favourite bit!

Unfortunately this year it was not to be. England came third behind Scotland and Ireland, with Wales in fourth place.

Jack's journey in the world of competitive fly fishing continues with more recreational and competitive fishing, including the qualifiers for next year's England Youth team at Grafham Water in Huntingdonshire. We look forward to hearing about his progress, and finding out whether he's earned the right to jump in after winning a competition! Well done to Jack for showing the determination, skill, patience and teamwork it takes to fish at this level, and thanks to @EnglandYouthFlyFishing plus all the coaches, families and support teams.

Richmond School and Sixth Form College's annual celebration of its students' extraordinary levels of achievement and success over the past academic year was, once again, an early high point in the calendar. The event focuses on individual students but also has a genuine community feel, with a number of the awards presented by community business and group leaders. Parents, families, and teachers also attended the packed hall and were able to share in the sense of pride as the students collected their awards.

This year the guest of honour was Rebecca Lundberg, a celebrated and successful educator and musician. Rebecca is musical director of Leyburn Band, as well as principal trombone in Stockport's Fairey Band. She is a published composer, with compositions and arrangements regularly performed on national radio and television.

Rebecca is a senior lecturer in Initial Teacher Education at the University of Huddersfield, as well as Music Curriculum Lead at Oak National Academy.

The evening opened with a welcome address from Sophia O'Callaghan, Head Girl and Jake Percival, Head Boy. This was followed by an inspirational keynote speech from our guest, who took us through some of the formative moments in her life including her time as a student at Richmond School. Rebecca's key message focused on what success can mean to different people, and how it can be achieved by anyone. It was a thought provoking and heartfelt address that really hit home to the audience.







The award ceremony then followed, with subject certificates being awarded to all year groups, from Year 7 to Year 13. The prize giving ran like clockwork, with Ms. Richardson reading the names of the winners, and Rebecca presenting the certificates. Ellie has pushed herself to achieve above and beyond expectation at every stage, eventually achieving a Distinction* and two Distinction grades in her CTEC Sport course. Thomas Greer, Toby Watson and Amy Salvin were joint winners of the Soroptomists' Cup, presented by Sue Young of Soroptimists International, Richmond and Dales. These three students set up a school wide campaign collecting donations for the Store House, a local food bank. Elaine Walton, formerly Chair of the Trustees, presented Ellie Hawes with the Trustees' Cup for her outstanding commitment to school life and her successful application to become a Special Constable, as well as starting her university course in Professional Policing at Northumbria University. 

A VISIT FROM SIMON ARMITAGE, POET LAUREATE

We were very excited to welcome Poet Laureate, Simon Armitage to Richmond School on Friday, to share his experiences and poetry and to answer our students' questions. The visit was part of our commitment to valuing and developing 'Language for Learning' in our students and was made possible through the generosity of our school Trustees. All GCSE English Literature students study Simon Armitage's poetry, and to hear it read aloud in Simon's own voice was an invaluable experience and a real treat.

The visit involved all of our Year 10 students along with those studying English Language or Literature in Year 12. We were also delighted to welcome back some of our Year 13 English students who returned for the event and managed to get a selfie with Simon afterwards - definitely one for the University bedroom wall! Some of our Year 11 students who hope to return in September to study English at 'A' Level also joined us for this special event as part of our commitment to their transition to Sixth Form studies.

Simon Armitage spoke about the experiences of being young - relationships with parents, doing things which may be disapproved of, the need to feel different and define yourself. In answer to a question from one of our students about what message he would like to share with young people through his poetry, he spoke compellingly of the power of language and the importance of expression. Treasuring language is something we feel passionate about at Richmond School, and it was wonderful for our students to hear this message from the Poet Laureate.

Hannah Slater, Year 11 student who will be returning to Richmond Sixth Form in the Autumn, said of the poetry reading, 'You felt like you knew Mr Armitage personally. It was an intimate experience.' This comment reflects the generosity of Simon's sharing of personal experience and his combination of erudite poet and down to earth Yorkshireman, which clearly resonated with our students. Arlo Wheatley, Year 10 student also commented 'It was inspiring to hear about his journey through poetry'.

As part of our lead up to this visit, students were invited to submit an entry to our poetry competition on the theme of 'Doorways'. Winner Ellie Hughes, Year 10, was presented with her prize by Simon Armitage. A wonderful memory for her and further encouragement to continue to pursue her love of writing after winning another poetry competition for the children of military families earlier in the year.

The power of language and the importance of expression: messages we hope our students take forward into their studies and their lives. It was a superb opportunity to hear from a once in a generation poet and a thoroughly nice man.





YEAR 10 STUDENTS ATTEND LONDON PARTICLE PHYSICS SUMMER SCHOOL.

Every year, St. Paul's School in central London holds a three day summer school for students with an interest in particle physics. It is a prestigious event with only 27 places available nationally. The selection process involves writing a short essay describing the student's interest in particle physics, and how they feel they would benefit from attending the course. This year three Year 10 students from Richmond School successfully applied for the course - Matty Partridge, Guy Feakins and Jake Gault.

The three days consisted of a series of lectures and practical workshops, focusing on different aspects of particle physics. Particle physics is a complex branch of the science that is only touched on during GCSE, so the academic demand of the summer school was quite a way out of the students' comfort zone! Listening to them talk about the lectures and workshops, however, it is very clear that they enjoyed this challenge immensely, and were very much up to demand of the content.



Some of the topics covered during the course were the origins of particle physics and particle accelerators, the behaviour of electrons in magnetic fields, quantum physics, the recently discovered Higgs boson, and a variety of other particles including photons, Z-bosons and quarks. These concepts are notoriously difficult to understand, let alone explain and the three students did a brilliant job explaining them to me!

While talking about particular high points of the course, Matty said: "You'd always heard about these particles smaller than atoms, but we'd never really learnt about them. Then when you're introduced to a completely theoretical world that you have no concept of, it builds a brilliant fascination about a hidden micro-world - atoms are made of something else - wow, that's incredible!"

All three students participated in the summer school with great enthusiasm and teamwork, and it certainly sounds like they gained a great deal from the experience. We wish them all the best with their studies in Year 11 - it sounds like there are very likely to be three recruits for A Level physics in a year's time!
